

Thoughts from our Supreme Chaplain, Rev. Andrew S. Hvozdovic RESPECT LIFE MONTH

Every October, we celebrate Respect Life Month. We consider more deeply why every human life is valuable and reflect on how to build a culture that protects life from conception to natural

death. The theme for 2024 is "I Came So That They Might Have Life".

We are each called by God to be that light of Christ that breaks through the darkness. We are called to be his disciples, continually transformed by our encounter with him and sharing in his mission. Jesus came that we might

have life.

The U.S. bishops have affirmed that, while it is important to address all the ways in which human life is threatened, "Abortion remains our pre-eminent priority as it directly attacks our most vulnerable brothers and sisters, destroying more than a million lives each year in our country alone."

As Pope St. John Paul II wrote,

"We are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life, the 'culture of death' and the 'culture of life'. ...we are all involved, and we all share in it, with the inescapable responsibility of choosing to be unconditionally pro-life."

From beginning to end, or "womb to tomb," the Catechism of the Church states: "Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains forever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole

end." Practices such as abortion, assisted suicide and capital punishment violate the dignity of the human person and must be rejected. In today's world, this truth can be subverted in favor of how useful someone is or will be, casting aside those most vulnerable: the unborn, women and children, those living in poverty, the ill, the incarcerated, those living with disabilities and the elderly.

In the very beginning of the Bible we're told that "God created mankind in his image" – that we were created to share in God's life through knowledge and love, establishing us in a unique friendship with our Creator that elevates us above all else in creation. (Gn 1:27; CCC 355-356) Each of us is a reflection of God called to share in love and creation. As we hear in the book of the prophet Jeremiah: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you." (1:5)

Therefore, God's love for his children is not based on usefulness or status in society, and Christ's life and teachings continually guide us toward that message: "Whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (25:40), and "Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (19:14)

Respect Life Month reminds us of the other part of that equation as we work toward ending the culture of death: respect. Not only are the people considering or supporting life-denying options often in dire positions, but they are also God's children. So when we come across this type of situation, let us be Christ to one another in our words and actions and speak the words of life with love and compassion.







THE MIXING BOWL



APPLE ALASKA PIE

Pastry for 1 crust 6 medium apples

3/4 cup sugar 1 1/2 teaspoon flour

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1 1/2 tablespoons butter or oleo

3 egg whites

1/2 cup sugar

1 quart butter pecan ice cream

Line 9-inch pie pan with pastry; trim edge; press edge down with tines of fork. Core, pare and slice apples. Combine 3/4 cup sugar, flour and spices. Rub a little of this mixture into pastry, then make alternate layers of apple slices and spice mixture. Dot with butter or oleo. Bake at 425degreesF for 30 minutes or until apples are tender. Remove from oven, let cool thoroughly. Beat egg whites stiff but not dry. Add 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition. Spoon ice cream evenly on top of pie within 1/2 inch of rim. Cover entire surface of pie with meringue. Bake at 500degreesF for 2 minutes.

PUMPKIN-PECAN BREAD/MUFFINS

5 cups flour

3/4 teaspoon baking powder

1 tablespoon baking soda

1 tablespoon cinnamon

1 tablespoon ground cloves

3 cups sugar or substitute

1 cup + 2 tbsp. butter or oleo

6 eggs or substitute

1/2 cup + 2 teaspoons molasses

1 cup orange juice

3 cups cooked or canned pumpkin

3/4 cup golden raisins

3/4 cup coarsely chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 350degreesF for bread, 400degrees for muffins. Sift together flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon and cloves. Set aside. In a large mixing bowl, beat sugar, butter and eggs until light and fluffy. Add orange juice, pumpkin and molasses and beat together. Add the sifted dry ingredients in 3 additions. Fold in the raisins and pecans. Pour batter into 3 greased 10 x 5 inch loaf pans or 1 loaf pan and 2 greased 12-cup muffin tins, filling each 2/3 full. Bake bread in a 350degreeF preheated oven for about 1 hour and 15 minutes or until a knife blade inserted into the center of loaf comes out clean. Bake the muffins for 20 minutes in a preheated 400degreeF oven.

PARMESAN ZUCCHINI POTATO MUFFINS

2 medium zucchinis, grated

2 medium potatoes, grated

1 small onion, finely chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced

1/2 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

2 large eggs, lightly beaten

1 teaspoon baking powder

Salt and pepper, to taste 1/4 cup vegetable oil

Sour cream and chopped chives, for garnish

Preheat your oven to 375°F (190°C). Grease or line a 12-cup muffin tin. Place the grated zucchini and potatoes in a clean kitchen towel or cheesecloth. Squeeze out as much moisture as possible. In a large bowl, combine the grated zucchini, potatoes, chopped onion, minced garlic, flour, Parmesan cheese, baking powder, and beaten eggs. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Stir in the vegetable oil until the mixture is well combined. Divide the mixture evenly among the muffin cups, filling each about 3/4 full. Bake for 20-25 minutes, or until the muffins are golden brown and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean.

PUMPKIN-SPICE PANCAKES

2 1/3 cup Bisquick baking mix

2 tablespoons sugar or substitute

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon ground ginger

1 cup milk

2 eggs

1/3 cup canned pumpkin

1/4 cup vegetable oil

Beat all ingredients with wire whisk or hand beater until smooth. Pour batter by 1/4 cupfuls onto hot griddle(grease if necessary). Cook until edges are dry. Turn; then cook until golden brown. Serve with syrup below. Makes about 18 pancakes.

ROAST PUMPKIN SEEDS

Don't throw away those gooey seeds found while carving your jack-o-lantern this year. Roast them. Remove seeds from pumpkin and wash in warm water to remove strings and pulp. Let seeds dry. Spread seeds on lightly-greased cookie sheet and sprinkle with salt.. Bake in preheated 300degreeF oven for 20-30 minutes(or until seeds are dry and crisp).

This mix is a great way to use whatever Halloween candy you have on hand.

4 cups Vanilla Chex™ cereal

4 cups Cinnamon Chex™ cereal

2 cups chopped chocolate candy

1 1/2 cups candy corn


1 cup orange or red candy melts

SLOVAK POPULATION IN USA BY STATES 2024

Pennsylvania has the largest Slovak American population, with 175,373 individuals of Slovak descent, comprising 1.36% of the state's population. Following Pennsylvania is Ohio, with 107,450 Slovak Americans, representing 0.91% of the population. Connecticut has the third-highest percentage of Slovak Americans with 0.48%, although the actual number of Slovak Americans is much smaller at 17,295.

Other states with notable Slovak American populations include New Jersey (31,238 or 0.34%), Indiana (18,307 or 0.27%), Illinois (32,766 or 0.26%), and Michigan (21,980 or 0.22%). However, in many states, such as Mississippi, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Arkansas, the number of Slovak Americans is relatively low, making up less than 0.03% of the population. Overall, the Slovak American population is dispersed throughout the United States, with varying concentrations in different regions.

The region of Nitra is made up of a low plain. It adjoins Hungary to the south with the Danube forming a border between the two countries. The city of Nitra with a current population of 70,000, ranks among the oldest settlements in Slovakia. As early as the ninth century, it was a princely seat of the Great Moravian Empire. The first Christian church was dedicated there in 833 A.D. In 863, the great Apostles of the Slavs, Saints Cyril and Methodius arrived in the area and began the evangelization of the Slovaks. In 880, the Diocese of Nitra was established. It was the oldest diocese to be established on the territory of the western Slavs. Its cathedral-basilica dedicated to St. Emeram is Slovakia's oldest. In 1248. Nitra became an independent royal town. It suffered from several of the Turkish invasions in the seventeenth century. Nitra castle, which houses the cathedral complex and extensive museum and treasury, is one of the area's most popular tourist attractions. A number of art galleries offer various exhibitions and the Andrej Bagar Theatre offers the best in drama, comedy and the musical arts.



KEKETI PRESENTS PLANS FOR ORGANISING 2029 ICE-HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP IN SLOVAKIA

Tourism and Sport Minister Dusan Keketi held a joint press conference with Slovak Ice-hockey Association general secretary Miroslav Lazo to congratulate Slovakia's ice-hockey players on their successful qualification for the 2026 Winter Olympics in Milan and to present Slovakia's plan for organising the World Ice-hockey Championship in 2029.

In addition to Slovakia, Hungary and Great Britain are also bidding to host the championship in 2029. Compared to the other candidates, Slovakia is clearly ahead in terms of the quality of its ice-hockey and the popularity and history of the sport. However, it needs to resolve the issue of infrastructure, as the Ondrej Nepela Ice-hockey stadium in Bratislava is the only one that meets the IIHF's capacity criteria at the moment. SZLH is sticking to its plan to hold matches in Kosice as well, as was the case in 2011 and 2019.

"The Slovak government in the government manifesto committed itself to supporting the organisation of significant sporting events in the country and to supporting the building of related infrastructure. We're intensively communicating with SZLH and preparing ourselves for all the possible scenarios that could occur by 2029. I believe that our candidacy will be successful," said Keketi. He and Lazo mentioned the possibility of building a new multi-functional arena, stressing the importance of the sustainability of such a project.

"We can't build one hall for millions just for one championship to take place in it. It must also be usable by several sporting associations and for cultural events. We must seek an operator, with the municipality participating in this as well," said Keketi.

The alternative of several countries jointly organising the championship is also in the frame. In the case of Slovakia, the Czech Republic, Hungary and Italy would come into consideration. "The Czechs have expressed cautious interest. The ice-hockey arena in Brno should be completed by that time. We've also had signals of interest from the Italians and from Hungary. However, these countries aren't regular participants in elite championships," noted Lazo.

TOP THREE STATE REPRESENTATIVES SIGN MEMORANDUM ON FOREIGN POLICY

President Peter Pellegrini, Prime Minister Robert Fico and House Vice-chair Peter Ziga on September 1st signed a joint declaration on a common approach on foreign policy issues, declaring that Slovakia is firmly anchored in the EU and NATO in the document.

The signatories stressed that Slovakia will be a country that will sovereignly assert its foreign policy positions with-

out questioning its firm membership in the EU and NATO. They declared to support and promote this anchorage, including raising issues that can improve relations within the EU and NATO.

"Slovakia wants to remain a valid member of the EU and NATO, fully aware of its rights, but we want to be a proud member of these communities," the president stressed after signing the memorandum. "Let us never be afraid to speak abroad with a sovereign voice, because even a small state like Slovakia has the right to promote the interests of its people abroad," Pellegrini added.

The prime minister stressed that the document clearly states in what international structures the country wants to operate. "That is why I reject any scaremongering about leaving the EU and NATO," Fico said.

Ziga endorsed calls for sovereign positions of Slovakia in foreign policy issues, calling on the opposition to support the memorandum as well.

In the document, the top three state officials pledge to support a foreign policy that will reject efforts to take divergent stances towards individual states and pursue a foreign policy focused on west, east, north and south. According to the memorandum, Slovakia will strongly promote peaceful solutions to conflicts and international solutions and measures that will not harm the country' interests.

FICO: I'M NOT TRAUMATISED BY ATTACK, SHOOTER'S MOTIVES MUST BE INVESTIGATED

I'm not traumatised by the assassination attempt on me, Prime Minister Robert Fico said following his working trip in Handlova (Trencin region) on Friday, where he was shot and seriously injured almost four months ago.

According to the premier, it's necessary to look at the background of the attack and the motives of the shooter. He doesn't consider it to be a priority to address whether the security failed, he sees the problem elsewhere.

The premier stated that he doesn't think about the person of the attacker and has no trauma whatsoever. "I've even adopted a philosophy of my own that it just happened and I don't even desire any revenge," he stated, reiterating that he isn't taking any legal action in relation to the attacker and won't even seek any compensation.

Rather, he said, it's necessary to talk about the background to the assassination attempt. "We need to tell the Slovak public, first of all, what actually happened, because the opposition would like us to deal with the security service, whether it failed or not, and there is a different problem here. Here is the problem that someone wanted to assassinate the prime minister because of political hatred, now I'm not talking about Robert Fico, I'm talking about the prime minister of the Slovak Republic," stressed Fico, adding that Parliament should also discuss the issue.

Fico stated in August that the House should address

the report on the assassination attempt in the autumn. He added on Friday that there should be an investigation into who the attacker was communicating with. "Someone will write it [the report], I'm waiting to see if it is the Interior Ministry or someone else. That report has to naturally come to the environment, I expect it should be in early September, because that was announced a few weeks ago, but I don't want to be involved in the report and its compilation, I don't want to bring my own attitudes into it," he added, reiterating that the opposition and part of the media refused to respect the results of the parliamentary elections.

The prime minister was shot following an away-fromhome cabinet meeting in Handlova on May 15 by Juraj C. [name abbreviated due to legal reasons], who is now being prosecuted for a particularly serious crime of terrorist attack. The attacker caused several serious injuries by shooting at the premier five times from a close range.

NBS: SLOVAKIA FACES MANY CHALLENGES, ONE OF BIGGEST IS AGEING POPULATION

Education and talent development, modernisation of health care, the ability to cope with the impacts of climate change - these are some of the biggest challenges Slovakia has ahead of it, Slovakia's central bank (NBS) governor Peter Kazimir pointed out in connection with a document called 'Structural Challenges 2024' published by the central bank on Friday.

According to NBS, one of the biggest challenges for Slovakia's society and economy is the ageing of the population. "Slovakia is ageing. There are more and more old people and pensioners, there will be fewer and fewer working people. These are not hypothetical calculations. We will feel it significantly in 10-15 years," stressed Kazimir.

The central bank has calculated that the number of people of working age in Slovakia will fall by 280,000 over the next 15 years. As a result, their ratio to the post-working-age population over 65 will fall from the current 3.7 to 2.8.

Part of the solution lies in more intensive employment of both pensioners and young people, especially women. A well thought-out strategy will also be needed to attract talent and labour from abroad. However, even this alone won't solve the labour market problems. "Today, neither Slovakia nor any European country is ready to accept such a number of foreigners to compensate for the shortfall of domestic players," said the NBS governor.

"We have to figure out how to accomplish more with fewer people. In this, unfortunately, we've been less and less successful lately. The productivity of our employees is growing more and more slowly," pointed out Kazimir.

Modern technology, digitisation and the advent of artificial intelligence offer possible solutions for the future. However, according to Kazimir, Slovakia isn't yet ready to use them. More sophisticated investments also require educated people, he stressed. "Our education system cannot offer them to the Slovak economy to the extent we need them. In addition, many talented people, not only young people, are leaving us for abroad," he added, commenting on the NBS findings.

NATIONAL PILGRIMAGE HELD IN LIMITED MODE DUE TO ADVERSE WEATHER



Due to the unfavourable weather, the national pilgrimage to mark the Feast of Our Lady of the Seven Sorrows, the patroness of Slovakia, was held in Sastin-Straze (Trnava region) in a limited mode this year, with a Holy Mass inside the Sastin Basilica being celebrated by Zilina Diocese Bishop Tomas Galis.

The Holy Mass was attended by President Peter Pellegrini, House Vice-chair Andrej Danko (Slovak National Party/SNS) and other figures of social and political life. The main theme of this year's national pilgrimage was the sight of Our Lady of the Seven Sorrows, Mother of Hope.

According to Galis, the situation in society often puts even close people before the question as to which '-ism' they lean towards. "As if we only had a choice of some '-isms'. In the past it was socialism, capitalism, secularism, while today it is traditionalism, progressivism, individualism and others," noted the bishop in his homily, adding that the Sunday celebration gives the opportunity to subordinate everything in life to Christ, to love. He emphasised the importance of hope in human life.

Slovaks have been honouring Our Lady of Sorrows in a special manner at least since Ottoman incursions in the 15th century. The territory of Slovakia remained largely free of Ottoman rule, while the rest of the Kingdom of Hungary was occupied until the late 17th century.

Pilgrimages to Sastin began in the 16th century after Countess Angelica Bakic, wife of Count Emericus Czobor, ordered a wooden pieta to be made as a result of a promise to God for being heard in relation to suffering caused by her husband. The pieta was hidden in a nearby castle during the Ottoman occupation. After the occupation ended, it returned to Sastin, an ancient arch-deaconal seat. People began to venerate it, and it gained a reputation for healing.

100 g hrozienka

Studené maslo, múku a smotanu na šľahanie spolu spracujeme na hladké cesto. Zabalíme do potravinárskej fólie a necháme odležať. Cesto máme na dva záviny. Hrozienka zalejeme rumom. Jablká očistíme a nastrúhame na strúhadle s veľkými očkami, vytlačíme z nich šťavu. Cesto rozdelíme na dve polovice. Každú vyvaľkáme, posypeme nasekanými orechmi a nastrúhanými jablkami. Ochutíme škoricovým cukrom a korením na jablkový závin. Hrozienka scedíme a nasypeme na jablká. Záviny zvinieme, položíme na plech vystlaný papierom na pečenie a potrieme rozšľahaným vajíčkom. KRÁTKE SPRÁVY ZO SLOVENSKA



V slovenských horách prišlo od júna do konca augusta o život trinásť ľudí. V porovnaní s rovnakým obdobím za minulý rok ide o nárast o viac ako 44 percent. Rovnako vzrástol počet zásahov Horskej záchrannej služby o 27 percent. Hoci sa letná turistická sezóna končí až k 1. novembru, horskí záchranári zatiaľ hodnotili tri základné mesiace charakteristické najväčšou návštevnosťou hôr. Počet zásahov počas nich narástol oproti minulému roku z 350 na 445. Najviac narástli zásahy v rámci takzvaného nižšieho horolezectva a prevažne u ľudí, ktorí nedodržujú pravidlá, či už sú to smrteľné nehody alebo uviaznutia, alebo týkajúce sa ľudí, ktorí chcú byť horolezcami, ale nimi nie sú.

Po piatich rokoch na najvyššom politickom poste a trojmesačnej prestávke odchádza Zuzana Čaputová dočasne zo Slovenska. V USA bude pôsobiť bude na jednej z troch najprestížnejších univerzít sveta Stanford. Na jeden semester sa súčasťou jej každodenného života stanú prednášky a diskusie so študentmi. Kariérny posun, aký nastáva u Čaputovej, nie je podľa politológa u slovenských politikov bežný. Vídať ho skôr u bývalých britských premiérov či amerických prezidentov.

Pre nepriaznivé počasie sa zmenil aj program Národnej púte k Sedembolestnej Panne Márii, patrónke Slovenska, v Šaštíne. Slávnostná svätá omša v nedeľu 15. septembra sa neslávila vonku, ale v Bazilike Sedembolestnej Panny Márie. Celonárodná púť Slovenska k Sedembolestnej Panne Márii, patrónke Slovenska, sa koná po stáročia. Oficiálne od roku 1732, kedy bola socha Sedembolestnej vyhlásená za milostivú. Každoročne navštívi Šaštín počas národnej púte približne 20 000 veriacich. Aj keď program púte býva obvykle rozložený do troch dní, jej vrcholom je sviatok patrónky Slovenska 15. septembra.

Dlhotrvajúce dažde royvodnili rieky na Slovensku. Dunaj v Bratislave dosiahol 970 cm. Jeho hladina začala klesať po piatich dňoch. Škody v Bratislave odhadujú na milióny. Najhoršia situácia bola v Devínskej Novej Vsi. Devínska cesta bola pre autá uzavretá, dopravu z Devína do Devínskej Novej Vsi zabezpečoval vojenský transport. Okrem Devína a Devínskej Novej Vsi eviduje Bratislavský kraj najväčšie škody po povodniach v okresoch Malacky a Pezinok. Záplavy po extrémnych dažďoch postihli celú Strednú Európu, vybrežené rieky ničili a devastovali viaceré mestá a obce, stovky Slovákov sa museli evakuovať. V susedných krajinách boli dôsledky tragickejšie - povodne v Českej republike, Poľsku, Rumunsku a Rakúsku zabili vyše 20 ľudí a mnoho ďalších je stále nezvestných. Celkové náklady na záplavy sa ešte len odhadujú, no už teraz je jasné, že budú v desiatkach, možno aj stovkách miliónov eur.

OTVORENIE NOVEJ FABRIKY PONÚKA ŠANCE NA LEPŠÍ ŽIVOT

Menšiemu mestu v novozámockom okrese sa čoskoro začne éra priemyselnej revolúcie. Šurany sa stanú domovom novej fabriky-baterkárne od spoločnosti GIB EnergyX, ktorá bola vytvorená spoluprácou čínskej spoločnosti Gotion High-Tech a slovenského InoBat. Mesto v Nitrianskom kraji sa tak vďaka tomu stane jedným z hlavných centier pre výrobu batérií v Európe.

Výstavba továrne odštartuje v roku 2025, samotná výroba začne o rok neskôr a plná prevádzka nastúpi začiatkom roku 2027. Fabrika sa stane jedným z hlavných európskych centier pre výrobu batérií, pričom celá produkcia bude exportovaná do krajín Európskej únie. Tento projekt je dôkazom, že aj malé mesto môže získať veľké investičné príležitosti.

S veľkou výrobou sa, samozrejme, spája aj veľký počet potrebných obsluhujúcich ľudí. Domáci sa preto môžu tešiť na množstvo nových pracovných miest, ktoré im ponúknu nové možnosti.

Spoločnosť GIB EnergyX sa bude sústrediť na zamestnávanie občanov a občianok Slovenska, vrátane tých, ktorí momentálne pracujú v zahraničí. Pre vysokokvalifikované pozície budú potrební najmä z dôvodu odovzdávania skúseností.

Nábor nových zamestnancov je rozdelený do viacerých fáz a v súčasnosti sú potrebné pozície súvisiace s projektom v oblasti výstavby, manažmentu a administratívy. Nábor na operatívne pozície začína v januári budúceho roku.

Na projekte momentálne pracuje 23 zamestnancov, no tento počet sa má v roku 2025 navýšiť na 141 ľudí. V roku 2026 počet zamestnancov narastie na asi 550 a v roku 2027 bude potrebné zamestnávať približne 1300 ľudí.

Nová fabrika bude predstavovať dlhodobý zdroj stability pre región, čo je dôležité nielen pre súčasných obyvateľov, ale aj pre ďalšie generácie, aby mali možnosť zostať a rozvíjať sa priamo v regióne, bez nutnosti odchádzať za prácou do iných miest.

Baterkáreň prináša pracovné miesta v rôznych oblastiach, od výrobných pozícií až po technické a manažérske funkcie. Ako súčasť moderného priemyslu bude ponúkať nielen stabilnú prácu, ale aj možnosti kariérneho rastu či dlhodobého uplatnenia. Budúci zamestnanci môžu počítať s tým, že táto priemyselná investícia bude mať trvalý vplyv na región.

Spoločnosť sa zároveň zaviazala aj ku vzniku nového výskumného a vývojového centra v Šuranoch, kde bude potrebných minimálne 50 vedcov. Aj v tomto prípade sú prioritne braní občania a občianky Slovenska a momentálne sa spolupracuje s univerzitami na vzdelávacích programoch a prednáškach, ktoré sú prispôsobené potrebám baterkárne aj výskumného centra.

Spoločnosť tiež aktívne podporuje vzdelávanie budúcich odborníkov v spolupráci so školami v okolí. Prostredníctvom Battery Academy sa zameriava na motiváciu žiakov k výberu kariéry v oblasti vedy a techniky.
